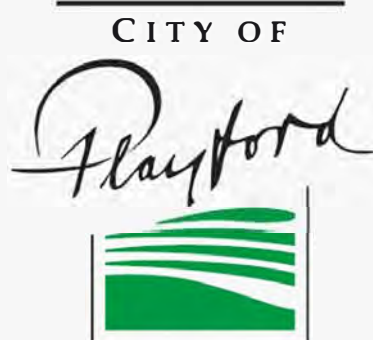

We explain what those words mean.



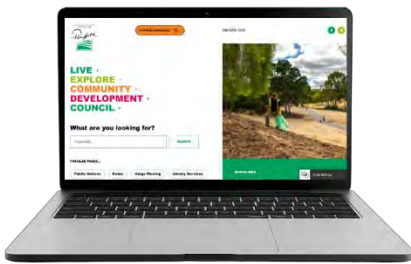

- Design of buildings.

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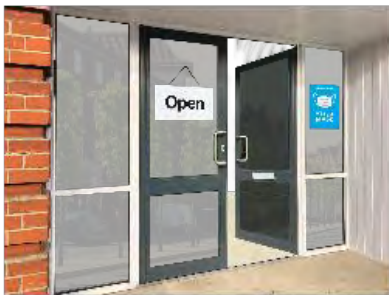
Disability Access and Inclusion Plan

Our Plan explains how we will make the City of Playford more:



- **Accessible.**

This means everyone can use it.



- **Inclusive.**

This means everyone is included and feels like they belong.

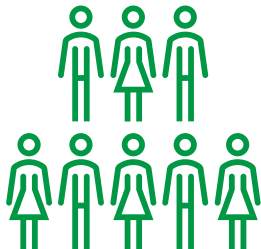


Our Plan has actions that the Council will do over the next 4 years.



We want the City of Playford to be a place where people:

- Feel included.
- Feel like they belong.
- Take part in the community.



In the City of Playford, 8,373 people in our community need help with daily living activities.



1 in 10 people in our community give unpaid care to people who:

- Live with disability.
- Have a health problem.
- Are older.

The feedback we heard from the Playford community helped us write our Plan.

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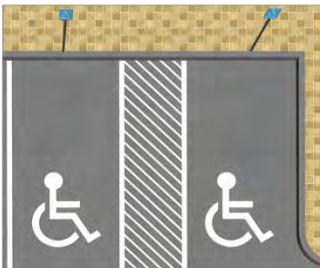
What we heard

2. Accessible buildings.

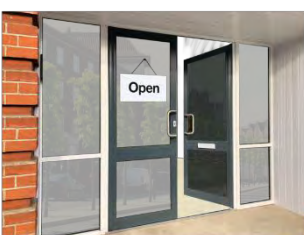


3. More education about disability.

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5. LGBTQIA+ people with disability.

LGBTQIA+ includes people who are:

- lesbian
- gay
- bisexual
- transgender
- intersex
- queer or questioning
- asexual

The + means people who belong to this community but use different words to describe themselves.

This includes people who live a long way from cities and large towns.

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What we will focus on



The South Australian government has made 5 **domains** we must follow.

Domains means the main goals for our Plan.



1. Inclusive environments and communities.



2. Education and employment.



3. Personal and community support.



4. Health and wellbeing.



5. Safety, rights and justice.

We will go through each of the domains in the following pages.



Domain 1: Inclusive environments and communities

What is our goal?



To make the environment and community inclusive for everyone.

We want our community to be a place where people with disability feel safe and welcome.

What we will do



- Have social events and programs where everyone can come.



- Make sure our Council staff and volunteers do training about disability access and inclusion.

This will help them understand the needs of people with disability.

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- Make toilets better for everyone.

We plan to add new toilets or fix old ones.



- Use **universal design** when building or fixing building spaces.

Universal design means making places easy for everyone to use.

This includes:

- Ramps.
- Clear signs.
- Footpaths.



- Talk with others to make transport safer and more accessible.

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- Make sure information about the Council's community spaces is easy to find.

We will have information online and in paper form.

This will help people with different communication needs and access.



- We will support local businesses and community groups to learn about being inclusive and accessible.



- We will continue to involve the Access and Social Inclusion Advisory Group.

This means members can share their ideas and help shape Council projects.



Domain 2 – Education and employment

What is our goal?



To make sure everyone has the same chance to learn and work.

We want to make it easier for people with disability to find and keep good jobs.

What we will do



- Create more **volunteering** opportunities.

Volunteering means learning and experiencing work without being paid.



- Have events to give information about how people can:
 - Learn.
 - Work.
 - Volunteer.



- Make sure there is support in the workplace for people with disability.

We will make sure everyone will get:

- Clear information.
- Good support.
- Fair rules.



- We will create learning opportunities for everyone.

This means people with disability of all ages and from all communities can join and keep learning throughout their lives.



Domain 3 – Personal and community support



What is our goal?

To make sure that people with disability have access to personal and community support.

What we will do



- Help people with disability connect with the Council and other local services.

We make sure information is easy to read online and on paper.



- Talk to community experts to learn what people with disability need.

We will design programs and services for people with disability.

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- We will review Council **grants** to include access and inclusion.

A grant is money for community projects.

This means people with disability are:

- Included.
- Have a fair chance.

This also means we can create grants that make accessibility and inclusion better.



Domain 4 – Health and wellbeing

What is our goal?



To have health services that are easy to access for people with disability in the community.

What we will do

- Make sure health services are easy to use for people with disability



We will work with:

- Government.
- Health services.
- Disability experts.



- Create health and wellbeing programs that are inclusive for people with disability.

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- Make it easier for people with intellectual disability to get dental care.

We will work with:

- Dental schools.
- Dentists.
- Disability groups.

We want to help people learn how to keep their teeth and mouth healthy.



Domain 5 – Safety, rights and justice



What is our goal?

People with disability have the right to a safe experience when they use emergency services.

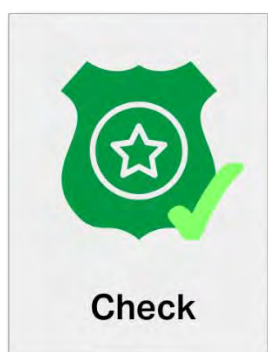
Emergency services.

Emergency services include:

- Police.
- Fire.
- Ambulance services and workers.



What we will do



- Make sure that our staff have the right checks to be able to work with people with disability.

This will help people with disability to be safe.



- Use the **Person-Centred Emergency Preparedness** framework for Council's emergency planning.

Person Centred Emergency Preparedness is a way to plan for emergencies for people with disability.



We will make sure that our staff are trained in emergency planning.

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How we will make our Plan work well



Our Plan will last for 4 years.

It will start in 2025 and end in 2029.



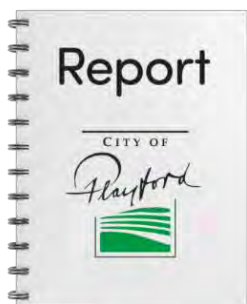
We will keep track of how well our Plan is going.
